A PASTOR'S HEART

Do you ever wonder why our church worships online or through drive-in services while the congregations down the street gather indoors? Much of the decision revolves around space and safe seating. We have a larger capacity to worship from our couches or cars than in the Fellowship Hall. We can only seat 50 persons socially distanced in the Fellowship Hall. On average, 92 households (132 people) have been worshipping online each week and over 50 people at drive-in worship.

Early in 2020, we formed a COVID Task
Force that monitors the metrics, creates safety
guidelines, and decides our next steps. The team
includes a leader from each discipline: trustees,
worship, evangelism, health, and education.
When the case levels rose rapidly beginning in
November, we quickly responded to keep
worshippers safe.

All of your pastors have a heart for reaching people with the good news of Jesus Christ. Pastor Paul, Pastor Jackie, and I have been taking courses and learning how to engage folks in worship in new and innovative ways. The church has been able to purchase new pieces of equipment and software to make it all possible. God is moving in our new forms of worship, and we celebrate the four new households that are becoming disciples and joining DUMC on April 11th!

Alongside the joy of new ministries, the burden of illness and loss weighs heavily on my soul. There isn't a family in our congregation that hasn't been affected by COVID. So many of us have faced excruciating pain and loss in the past year. Of the 150 households that make up the active disciples in our congregation, 21 people have been ill or had someone in their immediate household test positive for COVID. These are the just people that have shared their positive test result publicly.

As a pastor, I have a unique privilege to be with people in some of the most liminal moments of their lives. The moments of new life and birth, and death, final breaths, and the thin veil that separates the two. Three people, intimately connected with our congregation, have lost their lives to Covid-19. Two early on, as we were still learning about the virus and how to cope as a county, and state. COVID restrictions have kept pastors from hospital bedsides, and care facilities and phone calls have served as final conversations. I was blessed to receive a final call from a member of our DUMC family this past year. Those final moments were filled with love. appreciation, prayer, but also fear. Fear of the struggle and death. That conversation, in those final moments of life, will forever be engraved on my heart. Hours after hanging up the phone, they were intubated, and within days, passed away.

I share this story not to frighten you but to help you understand my heart. As a pastor, I strive to follow the United Methodist Church's first general rule – "Do No Harm." This past year, I have worked hard alongside the task force to keep everyone safe as we lived out that rule. "Do No Harm" meant closing our indoor gatherings and worshipping online and at drive-in services.

Sometimes I feel we are living a 21st-century version of the Exodus story. We have left all that was familiar behind. God has been with us in the wilderness of Covid. supplying us with the necessities of life, like water and manna, and yet we are tempted to grumble, and be willful. We can see the promised land. We will get there - together we just need a bit more patience as God prepares our souls and the land before us. We are not going back to normal; church will not be what it once was. We are going forward into a new, promised land.

The Lord said to Moses.

"Go, leave this place, you and the people whom you have brought up out of the land of Egypt, and go to the land I promised your ancestors." (Deut 33:1)

As we adventure toward new forms of worship together, please follow the guidelines for the sake of your safety and that of others. Only you know which worship service is healthiest for you. God is with us everywhere. And please know that each of you has a place in my heart.

11 AM – Indoors in the Sanctuary - Safely distanced in the pews.

The re-opening task force continues to monitor the COVID cases for our area. Currently, the number of cases in Anne Arundel is continuing to rise, and there may be further increases due to Easter gatherings. But, almost a quarter of the population has their first vaccination, which is very hopeful! If the infections rise to 25 cases/100K population, it is considered critical, and we can expect further restrictions. Last summer, when we were worshipping indoors, the levels remained below 15/100K. The team is working hard to monitor the local COVID cases and respond as necessary to make sure DUMC continues to make the safest decisions for gathering. Watch your email for updates and changes.

Safety Practices will be followed!

It is exciting to prepare for each of our worship options! And we need to keep one another safe and healthy. For every form of in-person worship, we will wear masks, social distance 6 feet, make use of the hand sanitizer, and refrain from singing together. Registration for in-person worship will continue.

We are very excited about Spring coming as the trees begin to bud in the beautiful new landscaping around the playground. The gardens will continue to allow the children to be surrounded by nature for years to come.

Last month, while the teachers were waiting on their second round of shots, we had two teachers test positive in the 2's classroom. Thanks to the hard work, social distancing, and cleaning guidelines the teachers are conducting daily, we have no more positive cases. The 2's classrooms were closed for a full week. In addition all the teachers and children were sent home for 2 days and were required to receive a negative test before returning back to school so we could be assured of a clean start. We continue to pray for the children and teacher's health.

We are extremely grateful for the classroom air purifiers that the parents and the church generously donated. The children's health is of the utmost importance to the center and our community.

The Center has applied for a County Grant and the second round of PPP. We are currently waiting on the response.

I'm relieved to say with God's care, the Green Cathedral survived the snow, rain and winds of the winter season. The trimming, cutting and mulching was done so it could look it's best for the Easter Sunrise Service; a beautiful time to celebrate our Risen Lord.


