PASTOR'S MESSAGE

So here's what I want you to do. When you gather for worship, each one of you be prepared with something that will be useful for all: Sing a hymn, teach a lesson, tell a story, lead a prayer, provide an insight. – The Apostle Paul to the people of God's Church in Corinth (1 Cor. 14:26)

When I left for my vacation in June, I was excited to begin the adventure of cycling from Amsterdam to Bruges, and I was calm and assured that I had put in place the preachers, musicians, and prayer leaders necessary for meaningful worship and ministry. Knowing that Pastor Paul would be able to address any surprise or emergency that arose while I was away, gave me peace. And then, Pastor Paul became deathly ill. He became the emergency.

The leaders of our congregation pivoted quickly and handled the circumstances well. They called Mei Cobb and Rev. David Thayer to bring us music. They visited Paul in hospital. Our Staff Parish Relations Committee figured out how we would care for Paul and his family long-term. Guest preachers were welcomed and supported. All ministries continued uninterrupted. These outcomes were possible because our congregation believes in discipleship.

In our congregation, in fact in our denomination, we understand that each person is to be engaged in ministry in some way. Each is to know what their unique gifts and abilities are and develop a way to share them. Everyone is called into mission and ministry, not just clergy. John Wesley called this – "the priesthood of all believers."

Others have taken online courses and webinars to prepare them for their leadership roles. Still others have continued their education through other organizations like Stephen's Ministries and Grief Share. If you have felt the Holy Spirit nudging you to grow or learn how to use your skills in a new way, call me, and we will find a way to make that happen.

A healthy congregation is not dependent solely on clergy for effective mission, ministry, or worship. Each contributes what they can to build up this community of faith. As I now prepare for hip replacement surgery and four weeks of recovery, I am excited for the possibility to regain strength and mobility and I am confident that I am leaving a team in place that can address any surprises or emergencies so that our congregation can continue in effective mission and ministry.



What do you see?




