5 Lenten Bible Verses for Reflection and Guidance

During Lent, we enter into a season of preparation, self-reflection, and repentance when we seek to literally "turn around" and realign our lives and focus toward God. It is a time to give up things as well as take on new life-giving practices, helping us rid ourselves of distractions and our own selfish desires. By doing so, we seek to live and love as more faithful disciples of Jesus Christ.

Whether your Lenten journey involves giving up or taking on, or both, here is Scripture to help you contemplate the meaning of this sacred season:

No need to tell everybody what you've given up for Lent - if you've given up anything. Keep it in secret. It's a secret between you and God. What could be more powerful than a secret like that?


Giving up something to celebrate Lent? You could also do as these verses suggest: take on something. Volunteer at a food pantry. Contribute to your favorite charity. Donate some clothing or furniture. (see a list of community organizations below) Give your old laptop to Geeks for God. Giving can be another way of doing a Lenten fast. Taking on as you give up.



The gospel of Mark is so succinct. In two verses the writer describes all that happened to Jesus for those 40 days. We often get fixated on how Jesus went without food but notice here how the wilderness part of the experience was also crucial. To be alone. To be tested. To be with the wild animals and the angels. Before Jesus could begin His ministry, He needed that wilderness time. Can we not find a way to do the same as we look to grow in faith? Look for a Lenten retreat in your community.



All these outward things we do for Lent, the fasting, the time of silence and stillness, even wearing some different clothes, they are simply ways to help us do the inward things. That is to seek God in Lenten prayers, asking for God's mercy.



This was what came out of Jesus's wilderness experience. This was what all those trials gave Him the inner strength to share with the world, even as He knew what suffering would be ahead. A timeless message, always, for Lent.

No matter which prayer practice you follow, may you each feel your heart opening to God's presence over these next 40 days of Lent.

This program features biblical, Christ-centered teaching that focuses on grief topics associated with the death of a loved one. The DVD seminar features nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a small group discussion about what was viewed. Past participants have related how helpful the information and follow-up discussions were to them. Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing when friends or family have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people, including Christians, tend to stuff their grief instead of allowing it to do the Godgiven work for which it is intended. Don't allow fear of what others may think to keep you from what could help you. Confidentiality is very much a part of this program.

Your bereavement experience may be recent or not so recent. You will find encouragement, comfort and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, other family member, or friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in grief and that you do not need to live in bondage to certain emotions. You will learn valuable information about facing your new normal in life and renewing your hope for the future.

GriefShare will be held on Wednesday's at 7 PM for 13 weeks starting March 1, 2023 from 6:30 PM – 8 PM, in the church parsonage.

#### Lunches for the Homeless

This picture was taken at the LightHouse after the following people, Kathy and Robert Gabler, Carol Chell, Gene Wasson, and I, made 125 sandwiches on January 9th. We will be making more sandwiches along with taking granola bars, fruit, and water there on March 26th. We started doing this every 3 months during Covid. It is a pretty simple process, and anyone can do it by signing up on their website for 25 to 125 lunches during the week. The funding for this is provided by Social Needs and Outreach.



Though we deliver 100 toiletry kits for the homeless in December, it is actually an ongoing project all year. So, I am going to put a container in the in the foyer outside the fellowship hall, one behind the last pew in the back of the Sanctuary, and one on the porch of the office building. I will empty containers once a month and sort them in the youth room. Please when you go to the dentist, just ask for an extra toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, and we may get enough this way. Also collect extra soap, hand lotion, and maybe shampoo and conditioner at hotels and timeshares. There too you can ask for a few extra and they will gladly give them to you. If for any reason you have extra ChapStick, small combs, travel size deodorant, or hand sanitizers, you can bring them in too.

## My Dearest DUMC Family,

The Vernal Equinox occurs at 5:24 p.m. on Monday, March 20 (which happens to be a full ten days after the March full moon: -) This is significant because Easter occurs on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the Vernal Equinox. This year's April full moon is April 6 and is appropriately called the Full Pink Moon.

Unfortunately, because the Eastern Orthodox churches recognize the older, Julian Calendar and the Western Christian churches recognize the Gregorian Calendar, Easter can be celebrated on different dates! As a result, there is a move afoot (providing a consensus can be reached among Christian churches) to change the day we celebrate Easter to the second Sunday in April. However, noting that this proposal was made in 1963, those who remain in favor of tradition likely need not fear and can look forward to continuing to celebrate Easter as early as March 22 and as late as April 25.

But, regardless of the date, Easter is about miracles. So it is that I associate Easter with the bitterly cold, totally clear morning of March 27, 2005, on Nauset Beach, Cape Cod. The ocean was like a mill pond, and when the Light of our world broke the smooth line of the horizon, the phenomenon was totally visible in pure, unabridged clarity. The earth seemed to stand still while the Sun slowly rose to become a bright globe sitting on the sea. My husband, Graham and I were blessed to have shared this moment together, and it will always be one of my most treasured memories.

Up from the grave he arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose! Amen.


