PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Invite! Invite! Invite!

Everyone is rooted or grounded in something. Many folks around us are rooted deeply in the ways of the world. When they pass our church they may think, "B-o-r-i-n-g! I went to church once and it was so dull, the pastor droned on forever." Or maybe they think we're in it for the money. Or maybe they've visited for a festival or BBQ sandwich and feel that church is a nice thing that some people do, but they don't see how it is relevant to their lives.

What was it like for you before you belonged? Were you wondering if there was more to life than work and family responsibilities? Were you lonely or lost in worry and uncertainty? Who in your life was living their faith? Who did you look at and think, I am not sure what they have, or why they make the choices they do, but I want that. I want to be like that. For me, those people were our neighbors Andy and Marti Keep. It was our discussions about parenting, negotiating work-family balance, and community responsibilities that opened the doors to church for Frank and me. Every member of DUMC is a minister. We each are an intricate part of the body of Christ and the mission of God. As we live our lives as disciples of Jesus, people are watching us. They are intrigued. Invite them in. Open the doors of church, and faith, and life in community. Invite!


No person is too far gone. Social media makes life look shiny and clean as we scroll through photos of other people's vacations, parties, awards, and accomplishments. It is easy for us to read stories about someone being far from God, who then experiences a life change that can only come from God. It is easy to read and think, "Wow - only God!" But when we meet Billy who lives down the road and is a drug addict, or Suzy who rents around the corner and has been threatened with eviction three times because she can't get her act together, it is overwhelming for us. Billy and Suzy are those people who turn up in church and talk your ear off. Five minutes after meeting them, you'll know all their problems. They're a mess.

Can we embrace the mess? We can because we know that God's saving power is bigger than any one person's sin. God works through the people and gifts of our congregation to bring healing and restore order to the mess. No person is too far gone. Open the doors to church! Invite!

We are real people with real struggles. The ways of the world temp us. Our lives are messy, and we are disciples of Jesus. We may not have it all together, but church is where we can get it together. We are a community that bears one another's burdens (Gal. 6:2). Invite others to struggle and grow with us.


Staff Parrish Relations Committee (SPRC) drew representatives from the various committees together to prepare the Congregational Profile for the Church Conference. They are working on advice for the Clergy Compensation for 2024. They are also in the process of hiring the new Coordinator of Child/Youth Ministries. The next opportunity to make sandwiches for the Lighthouse Shelter folks is September 11th at Debby Wasson's home.

Missions: Be aware that you can donate directly to Mercy Chefs or UMCOR (code 901670) to support relief efforts in Maui. The next **Tongues of Fire sale is Sept. 9th.** *The Sunshine team* has been caring for the homebound and ill well.

Trustees have completed repairs to the roof and bathrooms. They are waiting on the insurance company to make further decisions for the rest of the roof and the elevator room. When the elevator room is complete work on the Parlor will begin. Painting estimates for the Annex and other exterior work have been received. The Worship/Evangelism Committee reminds us that we celebrate National Back-to-Church Sunday on Sept. 17th . Not only will we worship in one service at 10 am, but we will also share in a big picnic. The new series Rooted will begin that day. September is a great time to invite family and friends to experience church with us. Church is life giving - invite someone! Give them a Rooted devotional. Grief Share begins Sept 6th. Pet Blessings are available in front of the church on Sunday Oct 1, 1-2 PM. We will be participating in the Community Cantata Dec. 17th at Galesville UMC **Finance** – We are approximately \$62,000 in the red as of the end of July. It is not unusual for us to be behind in donations at this point of the summer, but we seem to be a little more behind than normal. We are following the national trend of declining donations. While religion continues to be the category that received the largest percentage out of the ten charitable categories, that percentage has been decreasing consistently over the last forty years. This generation gives about half of what their parent's did. Plus, rising inflation means the donations we do receive have less impact. Since there are so many charities asking for donations the committee asked Pastor Wendy to write articles for the Lamplighter explaining how funds are used and asking people if they can Step Up their giving.





Our church depends on you to power up our mission and ministry with our presence, prayers, witness, service, and gifts. We planned on \$7,077 a week being contributed by our worshippers and community members to fulfill our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ and changing lives. So far this year we have averaged about \$5,439 a week in donations. The staircase graph above illustrates how our congregation gives. For example, 32 households (26% of our congregation) give \$5 or less a week. Another 17 households donate between \$5 - \$10 per week. These means that we are dependent on a few very generous families to fuel our work.

Our ministries are vital! With our congregation faith is strengthened, our little ones grow in body, mind, and spirit, loneliness is lessened, grief addressed, and meaning and purpose are found. We feed the hungry, keep roofs over people's heads, and help give kids what they need so that they can learn. Our church truly makes a difference both in the community and in people's personal lives.

Will you ensure that our impact remains strong? **Can you step it up?** Can you give \$5 more a week. That is about the amount that you would spend on a couple of cups of coffee. If your family is financially sound, would you consider taking a bigger step, for example a \$10-\$25 increase.

The most economical method of donating is account to account transfers. There are no fees for the church or your family. You set the amount and the timing which can be changed at any time. The forms are available at worship (ask an usher) or in the office. Even if you can't step it up, this method helps you donate regularly. It helps both you and the church stay on budget.

Our congregation has been making a difference in Davidsonville and the surrounding community for 179 years. Will you trust in God's abundance and step it up so that this work can continue with strength?

How Davidsonville United Methodist Church Uses Resources

(YTD totals include a percentage of salaries, building costs and administration expenses)

Your church leadership has a bold plan of ministry to continue our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Since we are just over halfway through the year, it is time to review our plan:

1) To provide meaningful, life-changing worship each week- Worship

Serving the 348 people of our congregation, we have an average 140 persons in Sunday worship during out three services: 8:30 am, 11:00 am and online.

YTD Total - \$67,242 (30%)

2.) To invite people into God's love - Evangelism

We reach out to our community through our festivals and special events. Our next step is to engage community members in faith conversations through Back-To-Church Sunday, Grief Share and other activities such as Pet Blessings.

YTD Total - \$37,946 (18%)

3.) To nurture people in their faith journey - Discipleship

Sunday School, Bible Study, and Ask-the-Pastor provide a place for people to struggle with scripture and life questions and grow deeper in faith. The ill and homebound are visited regularly and the pastor provides counseling. Sermons are available on-line. Our big leap of faith is to hire a coordinator of children and youth ministries which will impact discipleship greatly.

YTD Total - \$40,796 (17%)

4.) To witness to our faith through service beyond ourselves - Mission


If you were to ask, "Where do you see God at work?" The most common response would be heard in stories of our missions and ministries. DUMC works co-operatively with other local churches to serve our community by connecting others to God and by meeting peoples' emotional and physical needs. In addition, our mission shares for greater UMC projects are fully paid.

YTD Total - \$78,241 (35%)

We planned on \$7,077 a week from worshippers and community member to fulfill our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

We have been averaging \$5,439.

How We Use Our Resources








Summer Storms



GriefShare New Session Starting Sept 6, 2023 at 6:30pm



This program features biblical, Christ-centered teaching that focuses on grief topics associated with the death of a loved one. The DVD seminar features nationally respected grief experts and real-life stories of people, followed by a small group discussion about what was viewed. Past participants have related how helpful the information and followup discussions were to them. Many grieving people find they are only beginning the work of healing when friends or family have returned to their daily life routines. Too often people, including Christians, tend to stuff their grief instead of allowing it to do the Godgiven work for which it is intended. Don't allow fear of what others may think to keep you from what could help you. Confidentiality is very much a part of this program. Your bereavement experience may be recent or not so recent. You will find encouragement, comfort and help in grieving the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, other family member, or friend. No matter what the cause of your loved one's death, this is an opportunity to be around people who understand what you are feeling. You will learn how to recognize the symptoms of being stuck in grief and that you do not need to live in bondage to certain emotions. You will learn valuable information about facing your new normal in life and renewing your hope for the future.
